Music Studies (M. A.)

Music is an important part of many people's lives, whether they listen, sing, play or dance. The Music Studies Master's programme hones a critical-investigative approach to music-culture phenomena and is designed to give students the ability to reflect on and actively help shape current music culture.

Students learn to examine questions in music research from different viewpoints: Cultural History of Music and Gender Studies, Systematic Musicology, Music and Media, Music Sociology and Music Forms Around the World as well as Intercultural Studies. The core of the programme is providing students with abilities and skills covering methods, theory, music practice, analysis, organisation and communication.

The Music Studies programme at the University of Oldenburg is based on a broad, discursive understanding of music which encompasses musical traditions and practices, the creation and development of value hierarchies, gender structures and music institutions, basic principles of hearing, sociocultural questions, openness and variety of music culture as well as economic and media significances of music.

Specialisations

Methods form the basis for all scientific fields. But what music studies methods are suitable for which questions? First, scientists need to know the methods available before they can apply them. Writing courses and lectures help students understand, discuss and apply musicological methods.

Musical practice is a key element at the Institute of Music: In one module, students have the option to work practically on music projects (press work, dramaturgy etc.) or participate themselves as musicians. Furthermore, this module is available for students who wish to extend their knowledge of music theory.

Overview: In this module, students get to know all the individual disciplines that make up Music Studies at the University of Oldenburg. Interdisciplinary work is essential here as well as the ability to recognise that (and how) a musical phenomenon can be examined from very different perspectives.

Advanced study: For one of the individual Music Studies disciplines, students can take an advanced study module that reflects their interests. This enables students to specialise in the fields Cultural History of Music, Gender Studies in Music, Systematic Musicology, Music and Media or Music Forms Around the World.

Project seminars and research-oriented teaching allow for collaborations with music institutions as well as offering insights into current research projects. During the degree programme, students should already forge contacts with institutions in the music sector. The Institute supports them in this with a large range of cooperation relationships with music-related organisations in the region and beyond.

Stay abroad

In the second or third semester, students have the opportunity to spend a period abroad at a university with similar degree programmes.
